I also attended the commemoration of Parihaka day at ANZAC Park. We have also had one wedding - with three more to go over the coming months, and a baptism coming up on November 16 for a new couple in our parish who are both being baptised -Samantha and Nathan Stroud.

It all kicks off with the Switch-On Service on Wednesday November 26 at 6pm.



Precentor's Page

Both rightly and unsurprisingly there is much talk about Cathedral earthquake strengthening; it is of vital importance if we are to continue to worship God in our much-loved and iconic building. But fundamentally, the building is only a vehicle for our journey, facilitating us to express and share our faith; if we distill the concept, our 'core business' is actually faith strengthening as opposed to earthquake strengthening.



It is tempting to use simple measures of success or failure in this essential task....an obvious (if simplistic) one is footfall! The more people that attend, the more opportunity we have to shape their faith. However, surely even more important than this is how deeply we take those people on their faith journeys.....how far can we stretch and develop them (and ourselves) in bringing about God's Kingdom here on earth? It's harder to measure but it's what we might label a sophisticated outCOME rather than a simplistic outPUT.

Our strap line 'A place that matters' is much more than a mere slogan and it needs to underpin our activities constantly. The more relevant the Cathedral becomes to people, the more opportunities there are for strengthening the building blocks of both faith and edifice. The ashlars of our faith are arguably more cardinal to the edifice than those of Takaka Marble.

Use as a concert venue helps to bring people through the door. Special services enable us to share our faith with others who might not normally attend. In particular, events like the pet blessing service and that which celebrates our relationship with the sea (on a date proximate to Trafalgar Day) bring congregants from other churches and indeed the relatively unchurched into our sacred halls. Many of these visitors travel significant distances to enjoy the special space the Cathedral affords. Shortly we will once more celebrate our Christmas Tree Festival, Sally Astridge's idea, which will Indubitably bring thousands through our doors, and provide the opportunity to evince a warm welcome to people in our iconic space.

It remains the duty of all of us to be ambassadors for the Cathedral and for all it might mean to us.

It necessarily follows that we must not sit on our laurels. We must continue to strive to promote the Cathedral's position as a place that matters.

The Significance of Music in Advent

Towards the end of November, the Church is going to enter a new liturgical year, starting with the season of Advent. The music of Advent holds deep spiritual, theological, and emotional significance in the life of the Church. It is not just a prelude to Christmas; rather, it is a season of expectant waiting, hope, and preparation for the coming of Christ - both His birth in Bethlehem and His promised return. Church music during Advent helps shape this mood and meaning in powerful ways.

1. Expressing Hope and Expectation

Advent music captures the longing for redemption that defines the season. Hymns like "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" or "Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus" give voice to humanity's yearning for God's presence in a broken world.

. These songs remind us that we live in an "already/not yet" tension — Christ has come, but we still await His final coming.

The tone is reflective, often in minor keys, to evoke a sense of anticipation rather than celebration.

2. Preparing Hearts for Christ's Coming

Music in Advent serves as a spiritual preparation for Christmas.

Just as John the Baptist prepared the way for the Lord, Advent hymns prepare the heart for the mystery of the Incarnation.

Singing these hymns reminds the faithful to repent, to make space for Christ, and to cultivate hope, peace, joy, and love — the four themes of Advent.

3. Maintaining the Liturgical Rhythm

Advent music preserves the distinct character of the liturgical year.

In many traditions, Christmas carols are deliberately withheld until Christmas Eve or Christmas Day. This separation helps us experience the journey — moving from darkness and longing (Advent) to light and fulfillment (Christmas).

The music helps the congregation live the story, rather than rush to its end.

4. Teaching and Remembering Theology

Advent hymns are rich in biblical imagery and prophecy. They teach Scripture through song:

"O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" draws from Isaiah's prophecies.

"Lo! He Comes with Clouds Descending" reflects the promise of Christ's return.

Through repetition and melody, these truths take root in the hearts of Christians across generations.

5. Connecting the Church Across Time and Space

Advent hymns and choral works connect the modern church with centuries of Christian worship. When a congregation sings "Saviour of the Nations, Come," they participate in a tradition stretching back to the 4th century.

This continuity reminds believers that waiting for Christ is a shared human and spiritual experience.

However, even a few visits to *Cathedralkids* will introduce the children to basic biblical truths e.g. understanding the meaning of The Lord's Prayer (the only prayer Jesus gave his disciples) and Psalm 23. 
